From nine months old to 90 years, people from near and far came to enjoy the performance at Martin Luther King Jr. High School held in honor of one of the world’s greatest individuals, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., as the world-renowned Philadelphia Orchestra took its annual Martin Luther King Jr. Tribute Concert into the community for the first time this past January.

## By Day, Thousands Came to Help

“I am very proud to be able to announce that the Philadelphia Orchestra is taking our Martin Luther King Jr. Tribute Concert into the community, and presenting it free to the public for the first time,” said Harold A. Sorgenti, Chairman-Elect of The Philadelphia Orchestra Association. “This continues the Orchestra’s commitment to celebrating the legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. and of taking our music out of the concert hall and into the community.”

Martin Luther King Jr. High School is managed by Foundations, Inc., which is dedicated to transitioning the school into a high-performing, competitive school of choice.

“This concert and partnership is a perfect example of unique collaborative efforts to provide the highest quality education and cultural experiences to the community we serve,” Foundations, Inc. CEO Rhonda Lauer said. “We’ve been working on it for months to bring the orchestra into the community, and it’s a dream come true.”

The 2006 Martin Luther King Jr. Tribute Concert marks the first time the Orchestra has taken this concert outside of its regular performance venue. And the community thoroughly enjoyed the presentation, with many people gladly standing as the capacity crowd of over 1,800 filled the high school auditorium.

“For everyone to come here, it means a lot,” said Cpl. Christine Henry, one of many Junior ROTC cadets who helped direct concert goers. “It says a lot.”

Taking the concert into the community reflects the Orchestra’s commitment to reaching new and diverse audiences. Since its centennial in 2000, the Orchestra has performed free Neighborhood Concerts throughout the Philadelphia region, bringing the gift of music into the communities where people live in an attempt to break down the barriers

that separates it from many people in the community.

It was a fitting end to a day that began very early, with nearly 2,500 community members, organizations, and others taking part in the annual Day of Service, held each year on the Dr. King holiday. MLK High School campus principal Jane Adams arrived at 5:30 AM expecting to be one of the first only to find many ahead of her.

## At Night, Phila. Orchestra Salutes

"We've had community service before and it continues to grow," Adams said excitedly. "The Day of Service, and the Philadelphia Orchestra, it's phenomenal."

The annual Tribute Concert began in 1991 and reflects the beliefs and convictions of famed civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., combining the traditions of African American culture and Western classical music. The concert pays tribute to Dr. King's vision of a society free of prejudice and racial division, his religious beliefs, and his belief in the power of music to effect change. This year's tribute featured many selections, including traditional favorite classics and African American spirituals.

"It was very nice," said community member Joi Thompson, who attended the concert with her very well-behaved nine-month-old, Xavier, who smiled throughout most of the performance and was as quiet and enthralled by the music as everyone else.

"It was lovely," said her mother-in-law, Joyce Thompson, who, along with her husband, James E. Thompson, were visiting the family.

Thomas Wilkins, the Detroit Symphony resident conductor and recently-named music director of the Omaha Symphony, who led the Philadelphia Orchestra's 2004 Tribute Concert, was the evening's guest conductor, joined by famed saxophonist Branford Marsalis. The program also featured a Community Concert Choir (Jonathan Coopersmith, guest chorus director) assembled from area churches and schools, including Martin Luther King Jr. High School.

Outstanding African American students from high schools throughout the Greater Philadelphia region shared their personal reflections on the life and work of Dr. King at the start of the second half of the performance. This is the fourth year the Orchestra honored high school seniors who,

through their superior academic and personal achievements, exemplify the ideas of Dr. King.

Support from Representative Dwight Evans enabled the Orchestra to present the concert, sponsored by CIGNA Corporation, free to the community. His leadership and vision were instrumental in changing the venue for the Martin Luther King Jr. Tribute Concert.

"I'm very enthusiastic about the Philadelphia Orchestra, Foundations Inc., and Martin Luther King High School partnership," he said. "King High School has once again served as the signature site for the King Day of Service activities. Residents across the Philadelphia region were able to join together for a full day of tribute to Dr. King.

"I encouraged everyone to spend the day at King, joining us in the morning for a variety of volunteer activities and spending an evening listening to a special musical tribute," Evans said.

"It's all the values of Martin Luther King Jr. in the community here," said Lauer, Foundations CEO. "It just tops the day. 🌞"

# Parents Kick Off PSSA Testing 2006

Parents are all “a-buzz” with the things they learned about the PSSA test at the Buffet Breakfast meeting at the Hilton. They were greeted by Dr. Dexter Davis, the dynamic NSN Administrator and Sherrine Wilkins, the Executive Director of School Services. Everyone was excited because over 300 parents and caregivers were in attendance. We especially acknowledged the presence of the “Grands,” a support group for grandparents who are primary caregivers.

The major foci of the day were the Math, Literacy (Reading & Language Arts), and Science curriculums. After the opening session and a full-course, hot buffet breakfast, the parents attended sessions designed for each key testing grade. Exemplary teachers provided the grade-specific workshops.

Indeed, work was the key word. After explaining the purpose of the PSSA Test, parents had the opportunity to sample test items from the student’s perspective. This part of the session brought some of the same expressions on the faces of the parents that are seen daily in our classrooms.

Everyone was relieved when they were provided with a demonstration of each type of test item. This activity gave parents a good indication of what the students experience during testing. Each parent left with a packet of activities to use at home with their children.

An issue that concerned parents of students in grades 3, 5, and 8 was the possibility of students who are “below basic” being retained. We shared with them the information from the School District of Philadelphia relating to promotion. In the follow-up sessions at the schools, more information and the support available for the remainder of the school year was given, including Supplementary Education Services (SES), Extended Day, and Saturday School.
